




## **About Reconciliation**

The Reconciliation Quilt was bought for \$264,000 in 1991, and later donated Nebraska-Lincoln.

The quilt was made in 1867, shortly after the Civil War, by Lucinda Ward Honstain of New York. The quilt consists of 40 unique blocks depicting scenes of hope and compassion as the country began to reunite.

Quilt finishes 56" x 64" 36 Flying Geese Blocks: 2" x 4"

Tradition with a capital T. Lovely florals and subtle geometrics surround a folk-art panel inspired by a nineteenth-century quilt. To turn the quilt into an heirloom, quilt around the printed motifs to give the appearance of hand appliqué.

### **Cutting Directions**

**Note:** Read assembly directions before cutting patches. The white border strips (Fabric H) are cut slightly over-sized. Read Step 1 before cutting. A fat ½ is a 9" x 20"-22" cut of fabric. WOF designates the width of fabric from selvedge to selvedge (approximately 42" wide).

#### Fabric A

Fussy-cut (2) panels each 24½" x 40½", cut crosswise (Read Step 1 first)

#### Fabric B

Cut (4) borders  $4\frac{1}{2}$ " x  $56\frac{1}{2}$ ", cut lengthwise

#### Fabric C

Cut (96) squares 21/2" for Flying Geese Blocks

#### Fabric D

Cut (7) strips 21/2" x WOF for binding

#### Fabric E

Cut (7) rectangles 2½" x 4½" for Flying Geese Blocks

#### Fabric F

Cut (5) rectangles 2½" x 4½" for Flying Geese Blocks

#### Fabric G

Cut (4) rectangles 2½" x 4½" for Flying Geese Blocks

Cut (4) squares 2½" for border corners

#### Fabric H

Cut (2) borders 3" x 49", cut lengthwise (Read Step 3 before cutting)

Cut (2) borders 3" x 45½", cut lengthwise

#### 8 Fat 8 's

From each: Cut (4) rectangles  $2\frac{1}{2}$ " x  $4\frac{1}{2}$ " for Flying Geese Blocks

#### **Backing**

Cut (2) panels 36" x 64", pieced to fit quilt top with overlap on all sides

### **Making the Quilt**

1. It is important to fussy-cut the 2 Fabric A panels so that when joined, the design appears continuous and the seam is invisible. The best way to accomplish that is to trim the panels so they are joined at the edge of the horizontal red "sash." Trim the top long side of one panel 1/4" beyond the red sash. (You will be trimming the background.) Trim the bottom long side of the second panel 1/4" away from the edge of the white printed squares. (You will be trimming off some of the outer red sash.) Place the first panel on top of the second and pin to be sure that the panels don't shift. You want the vertical sashes to look continuous. Join the panels in a scant 1/4" seam. Check the front side to be certain that the seam is right at the edge of the printed sash. If you are happy with the results, press the seam toward the sash.

2. Draw a diagonal line on the wrong side of each Fabric C 2½" square. Place a marked square on one end of a 2½" x 4½" rectangle, right sides together. Note orientation of the printed stripe on the square. Sew on the marked line; trim away and discard excess fabric (Diagram 1). Press open. Repeat this process on the opposite end of the rectangle (Diagram 2) to make a Flying Geese Block. Make 48 total, using Fabric C squares and all 2½" x 4½" rectangles. Set aside.



- 3. The Fabric H borders are cut slightly oversized to allow for any discrepancy in size once the panels are joined. Sew the long borders to the sides of the panel; trim ends even with the edges of the quilt. Sew the shorter borders to the top and bottom. Measure and trim the quilt to  $44\frac{1}{2}$ " x  $52\frac{1}{2}$ ".
- 4. Referring to the Quilt
  Diagram, join 13 Flying
  Geese side by side to make
  a pieced border. Feel free
  to follow the diagram for
  color placement or
  arrange them as you wish.
  Sew to the side. Repeat for
  the other side. Sew 11
  Flying Geese side by side
  to make a border. Sew
  Fabric G squares to both
  ends. Sew to the top.
  Repeat for the bottom.
- **5.** Sew Fabric B borders to the sides, and then to the top and bottom.

## **Finishing the Quilt**

6. Layer the quilt with batting and backing and baste. Quilt in the ditch around borders and block patches. Quilt around the printed motifs and sashes in the panels. Quilt outer border as desired. Bind to finish the quilt.



Quilt Diagram


